DEATH OF EMILY DAVISON, WHO STOPPED THE KING'S DERBY HORSE, AND IS THE FIRST WOMAN TO GIVE HER LIFE FOR VOTES FOR WOMEN.



The last scene and Miss Davison lies lifeless after the Derby Day incident caused by a flying skirt and photograph. Miss Davison is now being taken to the ground, and the King's horse is galloping on his victory.



Three photographs of the first martyr. Right is where she had the courage of her conviction and gave her life for the cause. The third photograph was taken on her return from prison after the famous incident.



A graphic illustration of the express speed at which a victory is won. It was when the King's horse was racing faster than a train that Miss Davison gave her life. Miss Emily Davison is the first woman to die for the cause of votes for women. The story began on Monday after her visit to the House of Commons during the Derby, and that yesterday afternoon in the Young Cottage Hospital. One of the first of the incident, she was alone in the room, and was lying on her back. Then at 11 o'clock she interrupted her rest, and the attention was directed to her through the prison window. On another occasion the prison officials had to give a dark jacket, but she was so slender that she slipped through it. For this reason she was wearing all night a dark jacket.
